Spotlight on Autism

Autistic people may act in a different way to other people. They may:

- Find it hard to communicate and interact with others.
- Find it hard to understand how other people think or feel.
- Find things like bright lights or loud noises overwhelming, stressful or uncomfortable.
- Get anxious or upset about unfamiliar situations and social events.
- Take longer to understand information.
- Do or think the same things over and over.

In Tamworth, autism assessments are carried out by the Children and Young Person's Autism Service. Once diagnosed, the service will then provide on going support up to the age of 25 years (if the child has an Educational Health Care Plan). The service is in place not just to diagnose, but to also equip families with the strategies to be able to lead a fulfilled life.

Referrals to the Children and Young Person's Autism Service.

Referrals into this service, can only be made by a professional who has met with the family (including SENDCO's). Once referred into the service, an NHS practitioner will triage the documentation and decide if an assessment is appropriate. If an assessment is not deemed appropriate, the practitioner may signpost to other relevant services.

It is currently taking between 18 and 24 months to complete an autism assessment. The service, however, is working with a range of external agencies to try and reduce this timescale. Whilst this may be frustrating, please rest assured that families will be contacted by telephone or letter as soon as an appointment becomes available.

SEND Individual Learning Plans

For pupils at Ankermoor who require additional support and are recorded on our SEND Register, Individual Learning Plans are in place. These plans will have focused and achievable targets which are personal to each individual child, enabling gaps to be closed and progress to be made. Sometimes, these targets may be linked to actions that have been set by professionals e.g., Educational Psychologist or Speech and Language.

When are the targets set and reviewed?

Targets will be reviewed, and new ones set at 3 points in the academic year. The dates for the remainder of this academic year are:

Week ending 15th March 2024 Week ending 5th July 2024

It is important that you as parents and the children are involved in this process, therefore you will be invited to meet with your child's class teacher at these points in the year to be part of the review process. If your child is on the SEND register and you have not yet received a copy of their current Individual Learning plan, please contact your child's class teacher.

I am worried about my child - what can I do?

If you have any concerns about your child, please share these with the class teacher in the first instance, as they may be able to put support in place. Where teachers share your concerns and support in place has not had impact, a Teacher Referral form to the SENDCO, can be completed leading to further observations and referrals to relevant professionals.
